His work has won several awards including PPC Imaginarium Award (2019), Eastern Cape Cultural Awards (2019 and 2021), and Ceramic South Africa Eastern Cape Regionals (2021). 



AGAINST THE GRAIN: SOME THOUGHTS ABOUT MY PHOTOGRAPHS

In this talk I'll show photographs from selected bodies of work from the past 35 years and talk about questions and concerns that underpin my thinking about photography and my work in particular. I will also talk about the ways thinking and making are connected; how intention might direct formal or technical considerations; how process makes meaning and how accidents change everything. And if there's time, I'd like to talk about how meaning changes according to the contexts within which our works are circulated - from the gallery to the community centre, to the public space for example.

Since the 1980s, Jo's photographs have reflected her ongoing preoccupation with the South African landscape and the ways in which it figures in the country's imaginary, particularly the violent legacies of apartheid. Jo has exhibited widely and her work is held in public and private collections locally and abroad. In 2007 she started exploring the aftermath of war in Angola, publishing 3 photobooks, Terreno Ocupado (2008), As Terras do Fim do Mundo (2010) and The Borderlands (2013). In 2015, the Metropolitan Museum in New York presented selected works from these three series in the exhibition, The Aftermath of Conflict: Jo Ractliffe's photographs of Angola and South Africa. In 2020 a retrospective of her work was held at the Art Institute in Chicago. Alongside her own practice, Jo has taught at the University of Cape Town, University of the Witwatersrand, Market Photo Workshop and the Salzburg Summer Academy. She has also initiated a number of independent public and educational projects that reflect on history, memory and identity in South Africa.















MÁIRE FISHER & JOAN ADAMS

CREATIVE PROCESS WORKSHOP 10:00 - 14:00



Joan Adams and Máire Fisher invite you to explore the creative process through a series of guided collage and writing exercises where images will lead to story, story will feed back into images. Artists, writers, poets, scriptwriters ... this workshop can be used by anyone wanting to find a point of departure for any creative process.

Máire Fisher is a writer, creative writing facilitator and writing mentor. Her two novels, Birdseye (2014) and The Enumerations (2018) were both published by Umuzi (Penguin Random House). She has also been published in several anthologies and online on various writing sites. Máire runs writing workshops in Cape Town with another writer, Chantal Stewart. She is a founder member of a group that meets for writing retreats at the Grail in Kleinmond.



Joan Adams is a ceramic artist, teacher and Co-chair of CSA western cape. Having studied ceramic design in kwazulu Natal in the 80s she taught design to young students and adults for over thirty-five years at high school level and at varoiuse Fet colledges. Joan currently runs her own teching studio and has a small production line.













HENNIE MEYER

FROM TEAPOTS TO INSTALLATIONS 13:00 - 15:00

In this workshop Hennie will explain how his thought process and continuous making, develops into a connected diverse body of work. He will show how a teapot spout can lead to a vase and eventually a large scale installation.

He will demonstrate his various ways of working, focusing on the continuous slab method. He will show how this method has resulted in visually varied works.

The workshop will include a presentation about the chronological development of his work from teapots to installations.

Hennie Meyer is an acclaimed South African ceramist. He works predominantly in earthenware, and enjoys the challenge of making composite shapes. Multiples fascinate him and he experiments continually with the expressive qualities of clay and glaze. Hennie studied in Australia and South Africa. He exhibits extensively, both locally and overseas. His work has been included in numerous permanent collections and international publications. He works and from his studio in Durbanville.
















WENDY COLEMAN

GRAND MOSQUE PRESENTATION WITH SLAB WORK DEMONSTRATION.



My background is in Art Education. For many years I taught Art in a variety of Cape Town high schools. I first encountered clay in a hobbyist evening class. I thought: in my next life I want to be a ceramicist. Fortunately I didn't have to wait that long: I discovered some rock hard bags of clay in the store room of my then classroom, to which I added water. I started using clay in my classroom - very reluctant learners began begging me to be allowed to work on their pots during break. The magic touched me too, and having left school teaching, I began working in clay at home. For many years I produced the range of domestic projects which I called Homebakes Ceramics because the first product I made was a cup cake candle holder "baked" at home. This range sold in the UK, the USA, and some even found their way to Japan! The problem was that I turned into a manager, not a ceramicist. So I went back to the beginning, and started hand-building in earthenware clay. I made bowls and large vessels which I painted with still life and lanscape images.

Then I discovered slab building, and my most recent collection is in unpainted earthenware. Working in clay continues to be my great delight, and I am fortunate enough to have a studio at home where i continue to work.
